The Brooks IHL Pediatric Residency program prepares its residents to educate and care for the pediatric population. This program is one year in length and consists of three components that include didactic/psychomotor classes, clinical mentoring and supervision, and directed learning activities. In addition, case study presentations prepare the resident for participation in professional conferences and potential submission for publication. The program leverages relationships within the community and the Brooks Rehabilitation System of Care to allow for robust experiences in teaching, clinical practice, and research. Our Pediatric residents have the unique opportunity to gain experience in several practice settings including a neonatal intensive care unit. #### The Physical Therapy Pediatric Residency

The Department of Physical Therapy's Pediatric Residency Program is a post-professional clinical and didactic education program designed to significantly advance the physical therapy resident's preparation as a practitioner of choice in the field of pediatric physical therapy.

The program combines opportunities for ongoing clinical mentoring with a scientific basis for advanced practice. At the end of the experience, the resident will be academically and clinically prepared to pass the American Board of Physical Therapy Specialties' (ABPTS) Pediatric Clinical Specialist examination.

The 2019-2020 academic year is our program's 12<sup>th</sup> year running. We have successfully graduated 14 residents with a 100% pass rate on the Pediatric Certified Specialist Exam.

Our program runs from annually from July to the following June. Applications for the next academic year will be accepted from early fall through December 31<sup>st</sup> via the RFPTCAS system. Interviews are typically in February and our program participates in the Uniform Announcement Program with other Pediatric PT Residency Programs across the country. The date for offers are typically made the second Monday of March via email for a late June-July 1<sup>st</sup> start date. #### **Pediatric Physical Therapy Residency Program**

#### **About the Program**

Cincinnati Children's Pediatric Physical Therapy Residency Program is accredited by the American Board of Physical Therapy Residency and Fellowship Education (ABPTRFE) as a post-professional residency program. Our 13.5 month residency program aims to provide practicing physical therapists with advanced clinical training to empower them to provide excellent, culturally competent, and evidence-based clinical care across the continuum of pediatric physical therapy and to empower them to accept leadership roles as a resource to other pediatric physical therapists.

#### **Program Specifics**

The residency program combines didactic and clinical work to encourage development of advanced clinical reasoning. The residency is designed to produce specialists in pediatric physical therapy who are effective in improving function in a diverse population of children and their families. Clinical work hours are in the outpatient, school-based, acute care, including NICU and inpatient rehabilitation, settings. Additional clinical experiences occur in early intervention and in various specialty clinics throughout the medical center. One-on-one mentoring

experiences occur in early intervention and in various specialty clinics throughout the medical center. One-on-one mentoring occurs in all settings and is provided by residency faculty who have advanced clinical expertise. Mentors guide the learning process through modeling, prompting of self-reflection and feedback. Didactic education occurs through the Leadership and Education in Neurodevelopmental and related Disabilities Program (LEND), participation in the Pediatric PT Residency Consortium and with modules and case studies developed by our faculty. LEND is an interdisciplinary training program funded by the federal Maternal and Child Health Bureau and is designed to train leaders who will improve the health of infants, children, and adolescents with or at risk for neurodevelopmental disabilities. Residents provide education and presentations in the LEND program and in the University of Cincinnati DPT Program.

Residents are salaried, full-time employees who divide their time among clinical care, LEND and other learning experiences. Residents typically spend 50-55 hours per week on didactic and clinical work. The pediatric residency pay is approximately 75% of PT salary.

Our program was accredited by ABPTRFE in 2012 and reaccredited in 2017 through 2027. Our graduation rate is 100%. Since 2013, 100% of graduates that have taken the PCS Exam have received a passing score and earned Board Certification as a Pediatric Clinical Specialist.



**Mission:** To provide post-professional training to licensed physical therapists that will advance their skills in clinical reasoning, evidence-based practice, patient/client management, teaching/education, and leadership, enabling them to become active participants in the future growth and development of the field of pediatric physical therapy.

**Program Length:** 14 months

Number of Residents Per Year: 1

Application Deadline: December 31st

Clinical practice: Patient care is organized into rotations differentiated by their areas of clinical practice within pediatrics, and each rotation is 8-14 weeks long. Clinical rotations include early intervention, school system, outpatient settings, inpatient rehabilitation, and acute care (at the University of Maryland Medical Center). Residents receive one-to-one mentorship from expert clinicians during each clinical rotation.

**Didactic and Scholarly Education**: Didactic activities are interspersed throughout the residency program and are integrated into each clinical practice site rotation. Residents will:

- Participate in KKI's Interactive Learning Modules and The APPT Residency and Fellowship Consortium with experts in the field of pediatric physical therapy.
- Participate in interdisciplinary education through Kennedy Krieger Institute's Maternal and Child Health
  Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (LEND) program, which seeks to prepare health
  professionals for the care of children and adolescents with neurodevelopmental disabilities, and to be leaders in
  their respective fields of practice.
- Participate in KKI PT department professional development trainings and have the opportunity to attend grand rounds and other professional lectures provided by Kennedy Krieger and its partners.

**Teaching opportunities**: Teaching activities are interspersed throughout the residency program and are integrated into each clinical rotation. Residents will:

- Prepare and present scholarly in-service presentations for Kennedy Krieger Institute and the University of Maryland Medical System physical therapy staff.
- Prepare and teach pediatric lectures and labs in the DPT program at University of Maryland.

**Evidence-Based Project**: Residents complete a year-long, evidence-based project (poster or manuscript) in an area of their choice.

**Outcomes**: 100% of graduates have gone on to practice as a pediatric PT and 100% of graduates have passed the PCS exam on their first attempt.



#### Mission:

- Restore hope and freedom to pediatric patients and families by developing therapists into expert practitioners
- Develop the skills necessary to provide high-value, expert rehabilitation care utilizing a family and patientcentered approach

#### **Program Components:**

The Clinical Curriculum involves 1500 hours of clinical care. This includes primary rotations in both the inpatient and outpatient rehabilitation settings as well as learning experiences in acute care, school-based intervention, and early intervention. There are also opportunities to observe specialty rehabilitation services, such as physician clinics, OrthoSeat (custom wheelchair and seating), Orthotics & Prosthetics + Bionics, Assistive Technology, and the Motion Analysis Center.

The Didactic Curriculum involves 300 hours of educational time that includes self-paced learning modules, in-person lectures, collaborative curriculum modules with other Mary Free Bed residents, and participation in the Pediatric PT Residency Consortium, all of which allow development of knowledge across all areas of the Pediatric Physical Therapy Description of Resident Practice.

#### **Clinical Mentoring**

Residents will complete at least 150 hours of mentoring over the 12-month program:

- 100 hours of mentoring during patient care
- 50 hours of 1-on-1 mentoring

"To provide post professional training to licensed physical therapists to advance their knowledge, skills in patient/client management, and clinical reasoning to enable them to assume a greater role in the area of pediatric clinical practice: evidence-based practice, leadership, education, administration, and consultation."

#### **Program Details**

The UM-NCH Pediatric Residency Program was accredited in 2013 and reaccredited in 2018. Our year long program (54 weeks) offers licensed physical therapists the opportunity to gain structured educational and clinical experiences in a variety of pediatric settings, including: hospital/acute care, outpatient, and school-based/Early Intervention. #### **Our Mission**

The mission of the Residency Programs in the Division of Physical Therapy and UNC Hospitals is to provide a superior, comprehensive specialist training to licensed physical therapists to meet the needs of North Carolina. For the UNC Pediatric Physical Therapy residency, this mission is applied to physical therapists and their work with pediatric patients.

#### Resident Program Philosophy

The faculty and staff of the Division of Physical Therapy and UNC Hospitals are committed to developing residents who are recognized leaders within pediatric physical therapy. Residents will develop excellence in examination, diagnosis, intervention, consultation, teaching and the integration of best evidence into the patient care they provide. They will develop as a resource for the community in pediatrics and will contribute to the profession through teaching, writing, and leadership. Graduates of the residency program will be prepared to sit for the ABPTS Pediatric Certified Specialist (PCS) examination.

#### **MENTORSHIP:**

You will learn from mentors with exceptional experience and who are experts in their specific areas of interest. Mentored time provided is a minimum of 4 hours per week, but may increase to up to 12 hours per week depending on the module content. This one-on-one learning with real patients under the guidance of clinical experts is the foundation of the program. #### **CURRICULUM:**

The program's curriculum is designed in modules that address all areas of the pediatric Description of Residency Practice (DRP). The didactic-only modules include the topics of clinical reasoning (2-3 weeks), evidence-based practice (throughout program), and teaching and learning (2 weeks). Clinical modules include both didactic and clinical content and include acute care (10-14 weeks), school-based PT (8 weeks), Early Intervention (8 weeks), and outpatient care (10-14 weeks). During clinical modules, the resident will have 4-16 hours of clinical mentorship weekly. Weekly assignments and module-specific mentor assessments provide the resident with regular benchmarks to ensure learning progresses throughout the year. There are 2 written exams and 2 live patient exams administered at approximately the middle and end of the program. The resident will also participate in the interdisciplinary Leadership in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (LEND) fellowship at the Carolina Institute for Developmental Disabilities, which involves clinical consultation through RSI and weekly participation in AHSC 862/864: Developmental Disabilities Across the Lifespan I and II.

#### **SALARY, TUITION AND BENEFITS:**

Residents are paid \$47,500, the equivalent of a new graduate salary for 3 clinic work day. Residents are eligible for full time benefits including health and dental insurance, and paid time off. There is no tuition associated with the program.



The curriculum will include enrolment of the resident in the Va-Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (Va – LEND) program.

**Direct Pt Care:** Primary Rotations—Acute care and Outpatient- 6 months each- ~28 hours per week (2-3 mentorship sessions per week) = 1456 hours

**Direct Pt. Care:** Secondary Site- Early Intervention- 6 months- ~5 hours per week- (formal mentorship provided) = 120 to 130 hours
