ADMITTANCE TO ACTIVITIES—CONFERENCE CREDENTIALS

IACP 2023 and its activities are not open to the public. Attendance is limited to IACP members and their guests, qualified nonmembers, exhibitors, and public safety personnel.

Please Note: Added security will be in place at the San Diego Convention Center. Attendees must always wear their IACP 2023 credentials while visiting the convention center. Conference credentials should similarly be worn when riding conference shuttles and attending receptions and hospitality events.



CERTIFICATE OF ATTENDANCE

All IACP 2023 full conference registrants (with the exception of companions and guests) are eligible to receive a Certificate of Attendance that indicates which workshops were attended.

CHIEFS NIGHT TICKET

Admittance to Chiefs Night is included with all full conference registrations. Attendees who purchased Expo-Hall Only passes but would like to attend Chiefs Night can purchase tickets for an additional cost. You must bring your IACP 2023 credentials and a driver's license or passport to gain entry to Chiefs Night. You will not be admitted to Chiefs Night without these items.



COMPANIONS AND GUESTS

Companions, spouses, and guests are an important and welcome part of our annual conference, but all guests must be appropriately registered. The Family/Companion Badge permits access to all IACP amenities and events, including general assemblies, workshops (excludes Certificate of Attendance), Exposition Hall, shuttle bus services, and IACP Chiefs Night.



CONCESSION AREAS

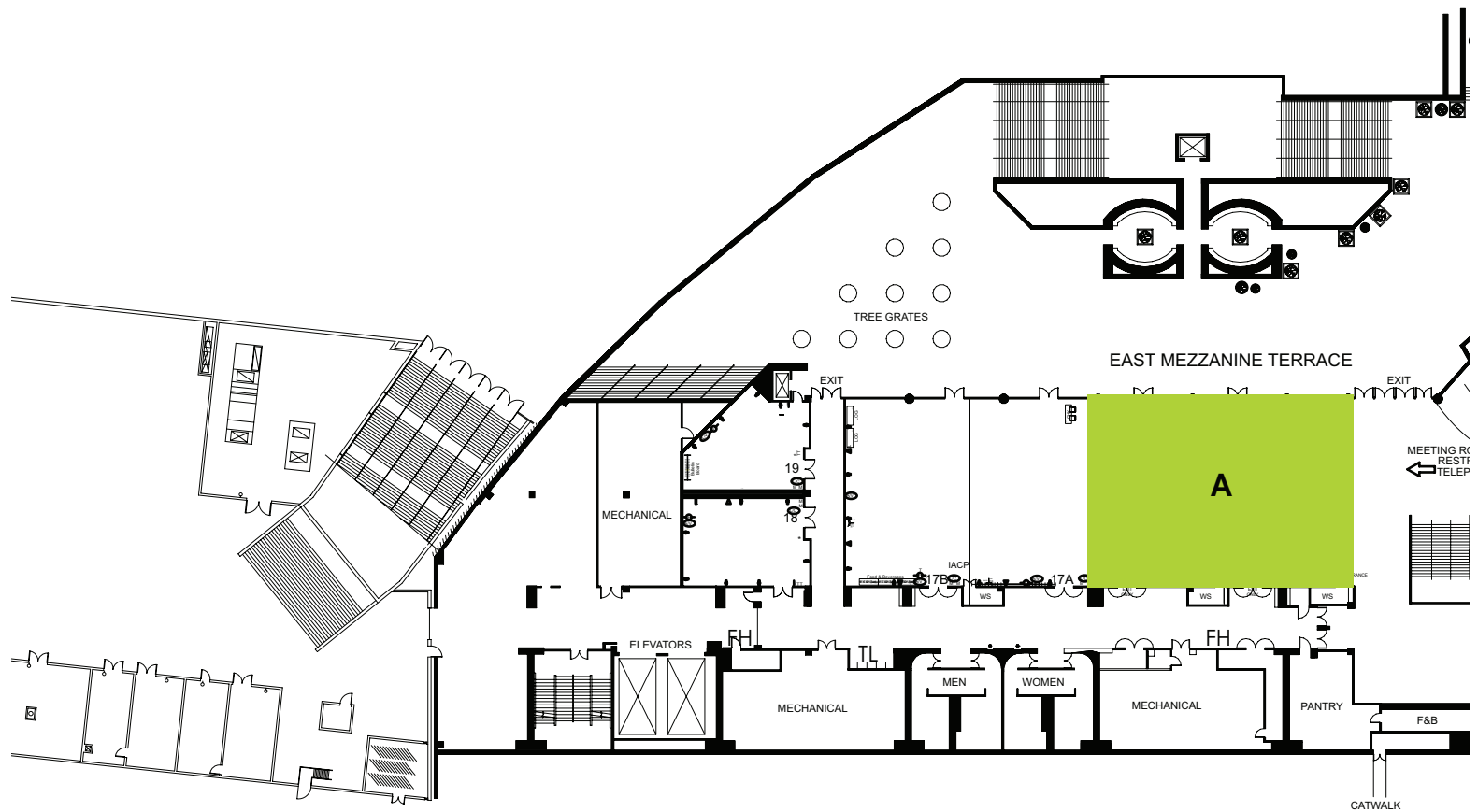


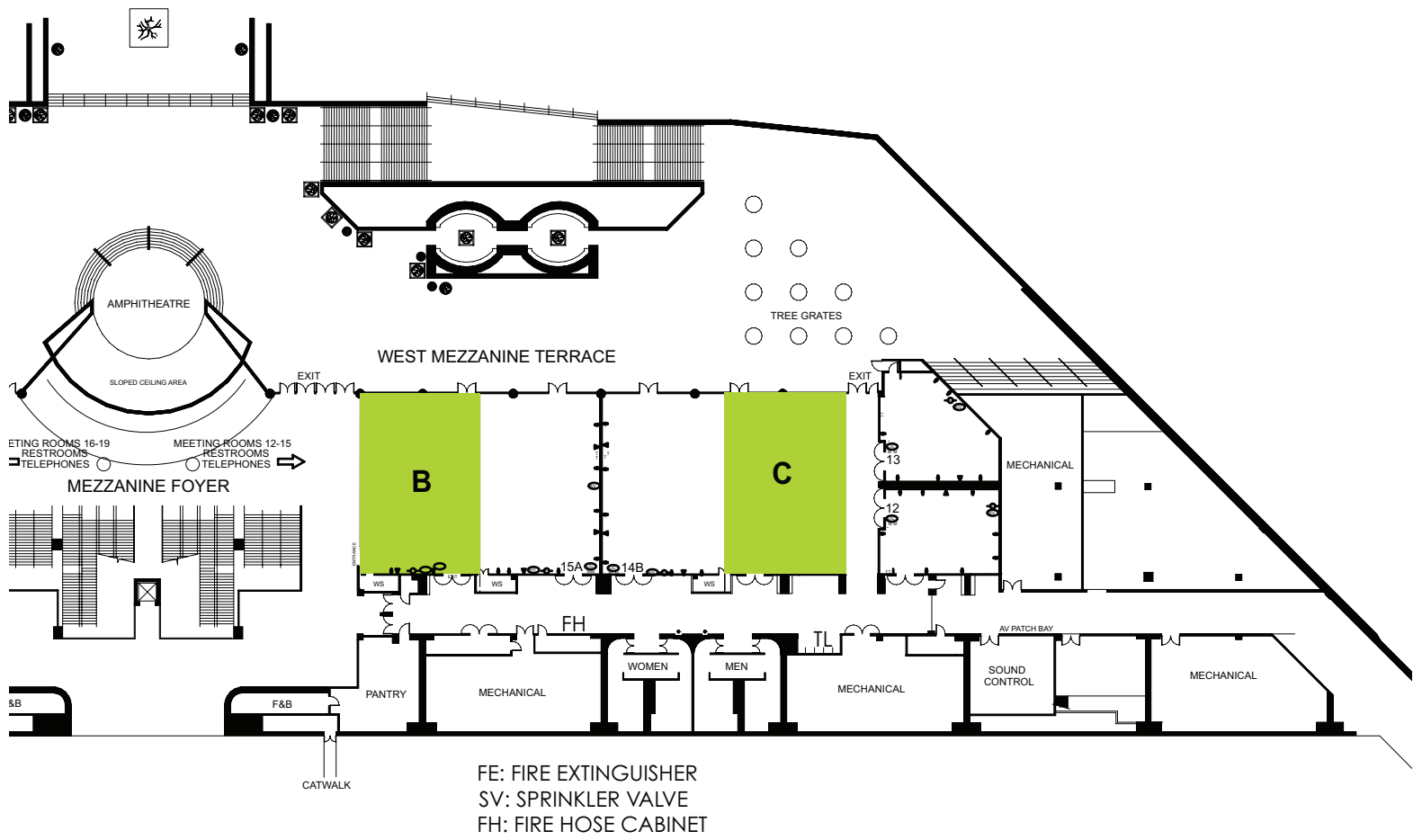

- C. IACP Operations Room/Lost and Found (14A)



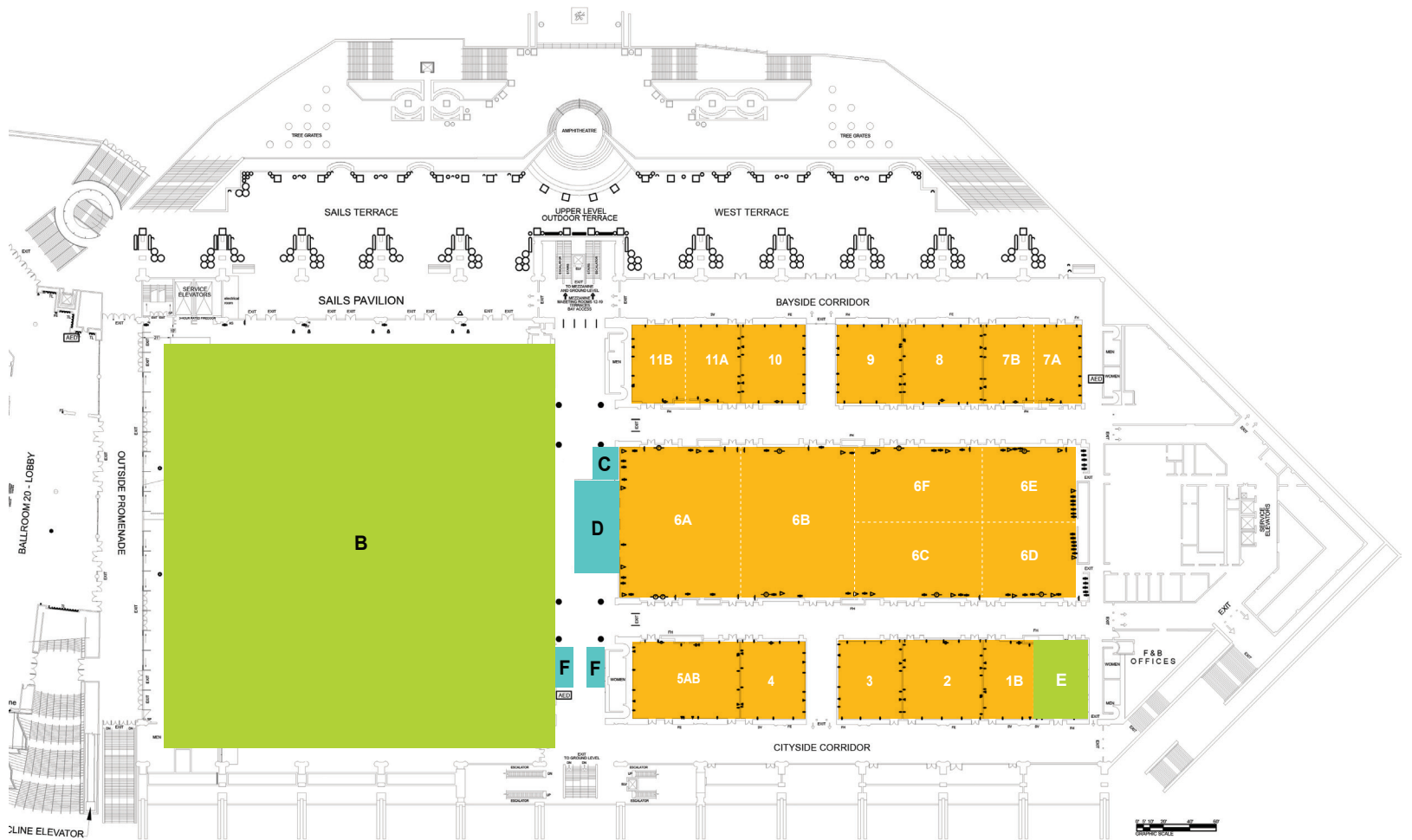

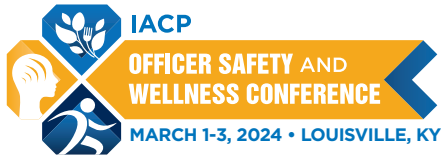
