

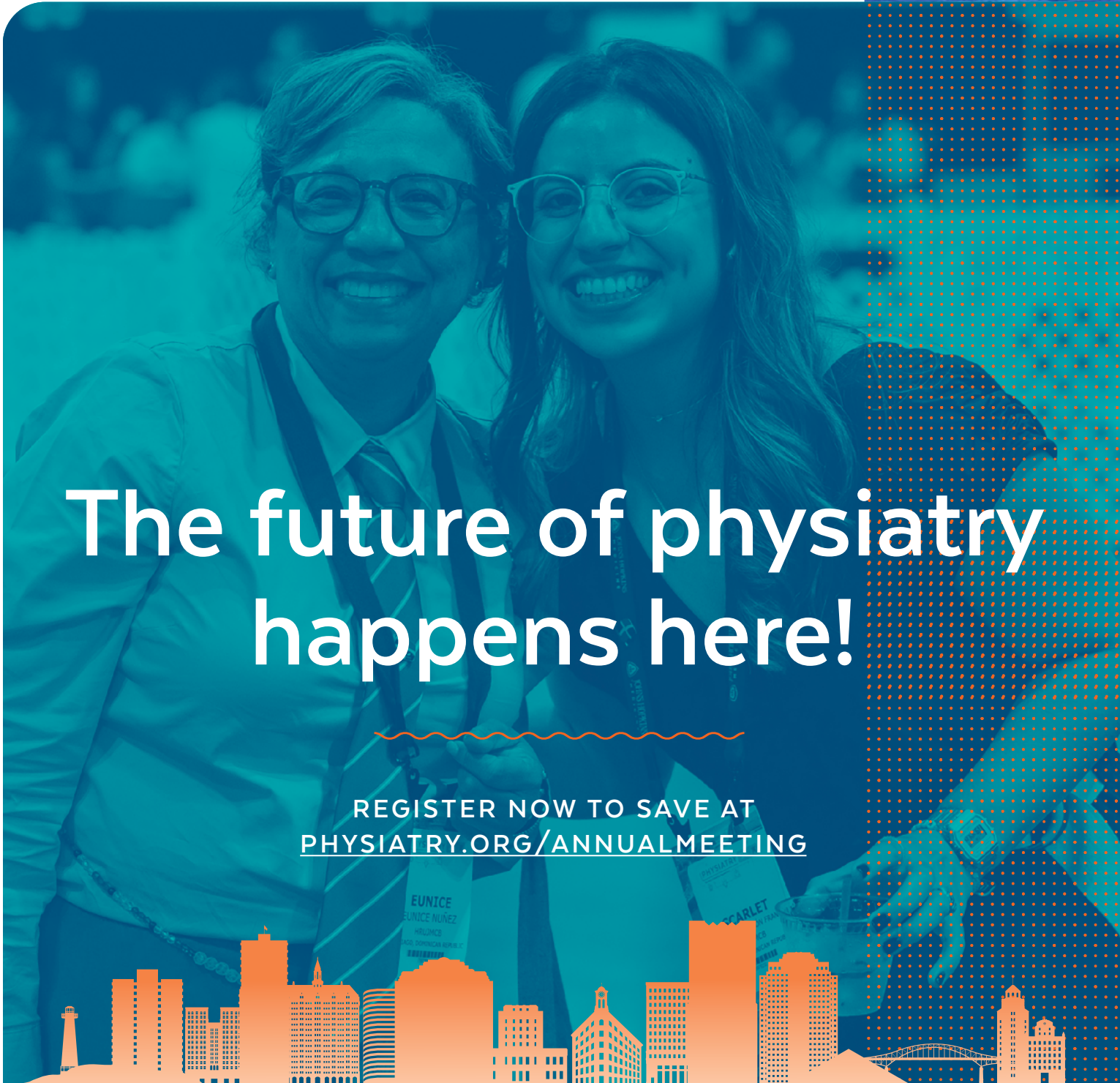

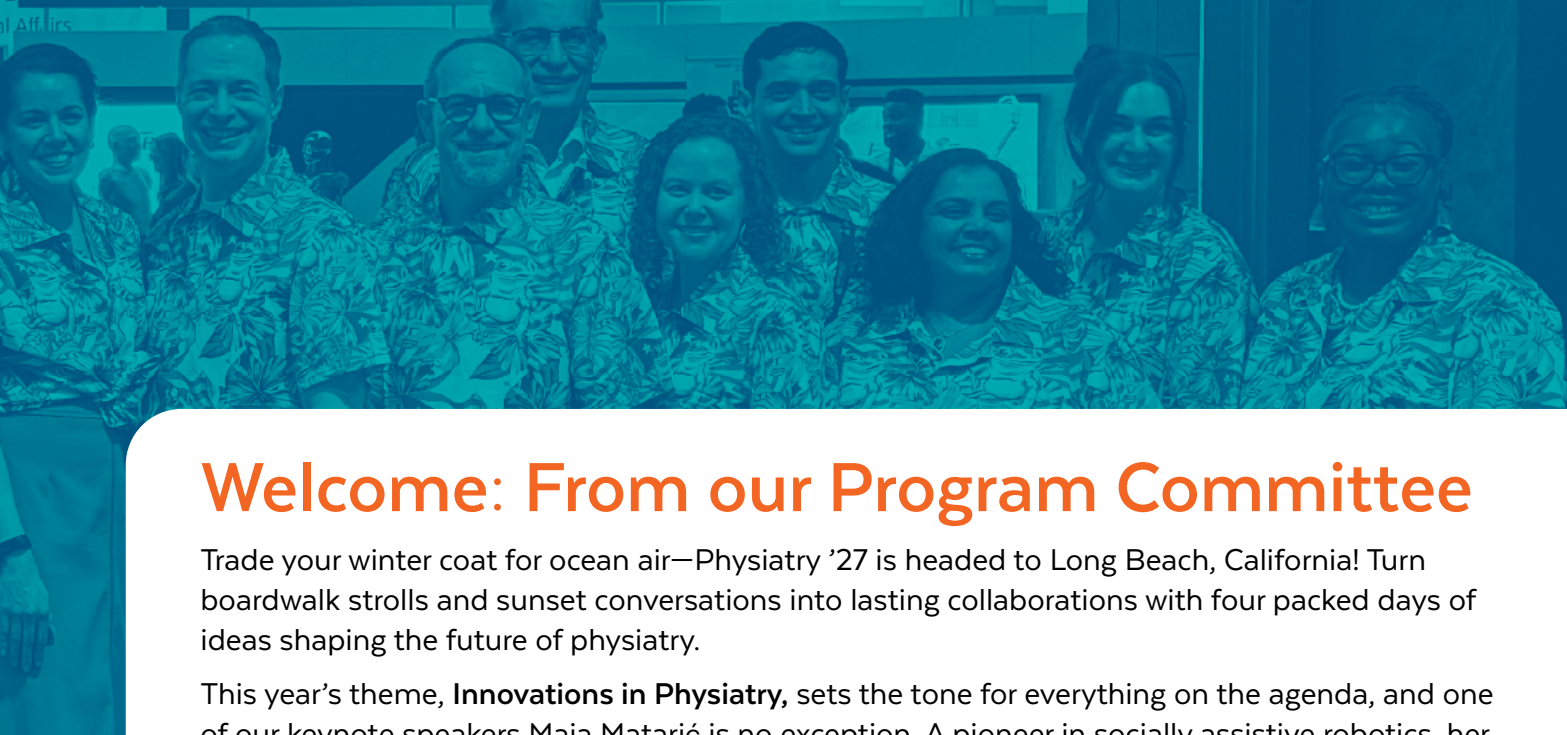

MAJA MATARIĆ

Chan Soon-Shiong Chair and Distinguished Professor of Computer Science, Neuroscience, and Pediatrics at the University of Southern California (USC), and a Principal Scientist at Google DeepMind

The Convergence of Robotics, AI, and Rehabilitation: Recent Advances and Future Directions in Socially Assistive Robotics

Description: Artificial intelligence, machine learning, and robotics are opening new possibilities for how rehabilitation is delivered—and how we help people achieve greater independence and quality of life. In this plenary, we will explore cutting-edge advances in socially assistive robotics and their real-world applications across rehabilitation, including stroke, cerebral palsy, cognitive decline and dementia, and promoting physical activity in older adults. Drawing on research conducted in homes, schools, and care settings, she will highlight how these technologies are moving from the lab into patients' lives and consider the opportunities—and possibilities—for the future of rehabilitation medicine.

A pioneer of socially assistive robotics, Maja's research develops human-machine interaction methods to support users facing autism, stroke, Alzheimer's, anxiety, and other health challenges, grounded in some of the largest real-world studies in schools, nursing homes, and homes. Her honors include membership in the National Academy of Engineering and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, fellowship in AAAS, IEEE, AAAI, and ACM, and the Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics & Engineering Mentoring.

Rehabilitation in Emergencies Lead, World Health Organization (WHO)

Rehabilitation in Emergencies: A Rapidly Evolving Role in a Changing World

Description: Rehabilitation is now recognised as an essential health service in emergencies, and significant progress has been made in recent years in integrating rehabilitation into emergency responses and Emergency Medical Teams around the world. At the same time, evidence shows that rehabilitation services are rarely integrated into national emergency preparedness, and as a consequence can be absent from early, acute response, to the detriment of patient outcomes. With the world facing a growing risk of pandemic and increasing conflicts and disasters, we are at a critical juncture where our professions must take a critical step to better integrate rehabilitation into local and national emergency planning. This keynote will guide participants through the current landscape and key steps they can each take to better consider emergency preparedness as part of their work.

Peter is the Rehabilitation in Emergencies focal point at the World Health Organization, previously serving as rehabilitation lead for the UK Government's Emergency Medical Team. Since 2010, he has led rehabilitation and medical responses to earthquakes, cyclones, disease outbreaks, and refugee crises, and has worked in conflicts including Ukraine, Armenia, Iraq, Libya, and Gaza. He is lead author of several key guidelines on rehabilitation in emergencies, including WHO's Policy Brief on Strengthening Rehabilitation in Health Emergencies and the clinical handbook Early Rehabilitation in Conflict and Disasters.

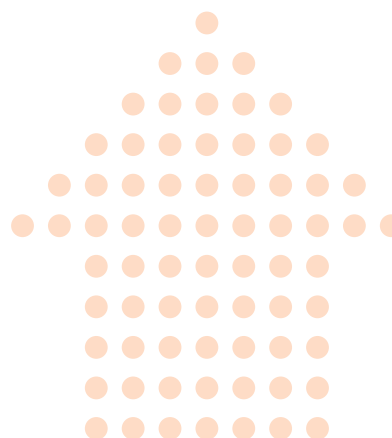

From Rehabilitation to Arthrodesis: Evidence-Based Treatment and Advanced Interventions for Sacroiliac Joint Pain

This session explores the modern treatment pathway for sacroiliac joint pain, from rehabilitation and injections to biologics, radiofrequency ablation, and minimally invasive fusion. Through focused talks and case-based discussion, the course will provide a clear, clinically useful roadmap for integrating both conservative and advanced interventions into comprehensive SI joint care.



Establishing a Research Presence and Clinical Niche as an Early-Career Physiatrist

Diagnosis and Management of Complex Nerve Injuries after Traumatic Brain Injury and Spinal Cord Injury

Nerve injuries frequently occur after traumatic brain injury (TBI) and spinal cord injury (SCI). Deficits relating to these injuries can represent a huge challenge for both patients and providers as they progress through their recovery. Nerve injuries after TBI/SCI and non-operative principles for management will be discussed in order to increase clinician comfort with encountering them in this patient population. Additionally, electrodiagnostic and ultrasound techniques that aid in the diagnosis of these injuries will be introduced and further related to driving clinical decision making toward operative management.



Ethics of Care for Emerging Consciousness Patients and Families

Achilles Tendon Rupture in Professional Sports: Recent Updates in Injury Prevention, Treatment, and Post Injury Performance

This session provides a comprehensive review of Achilles tendon ruptures in athletes, covering mechanisms, risk factors, and management strategies, including operative and non-operative approaches. Step Into the Future of Lower Limb Prosthetics by Learning How to Fit and Align Adjustable, Immediate-Fit Prostheses by Yourself

Lower-limb prosthetics are rapidly evolving with adjustable socket technologies that improve comfort, function, and access to care. In this session, clinicians will learn how to fit an iFIT immediate-fit adjustable socket. These devices accommodate daily limb volume changes and can help reduce skin complications. Modular and mass-produced, they can be delivered globally and fitted in most clinical settings using minimal tools at roughly one-third the cost of conventional fabrication. This hands-on workshop includes a live fitting demonstration, allowing practitioners to learn how to properly fit and adjust the socket for a patient with limb loss.



Innovative Insights into Chronic Cardiovascular Consequences of Central Neurotrauma

There is emerging evidence that both traumatic brain injury (TBI) and spinal cord injury (SCI) are chronic diseases with long-term impacts far beyond the underlying neurologic insult. Both TBI and SCI are associated with elevated risks of cardiovascular disease (CVD) and cardiovascular-related mortality, but the underlying pathophysiologic mechanisms are poorly understood and currently understudied. In this session, we will discuss our innovative research focused on potential pathophysiologic mechanisms underpinning this accelerated risk of CVD in persons with TBI and SCI and describe the clinical implications of this research.



Leadership Through the Lens of Emotional Wellbeing in Severe Brain Injury and Disorders of Consciousness Programs

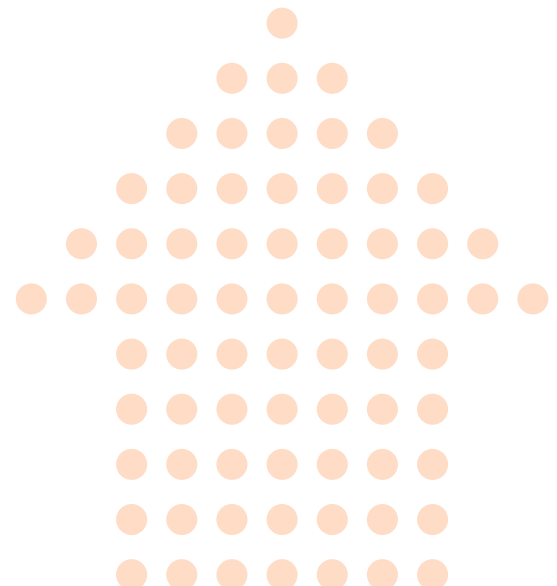
The emotional toll of working in severe brain injury and disorders of consciousness can be profound, and this discussion will describe how organizations have created frameworks of support in alignment with CARF International standards. Debriefing sessions, such as Schwartz rounding, allow teams to discuss the emotional challenges of caring for patients. Specific approaches to the navigation of difficult conversations will be demonstrated, keeping both person-centeredness and self-preservation at top of mind. Ensuring the emotional resilience of physicians and their team is critical to helping patients and family members navigate both prognostic uncertainty and hope.



Rehabilitation After Osseointegration: Practical Strategies from Physiatry, PT, and Prosthetics

Osseointegration for individuals with limb loss is rapidly expanding, creating new opportunities for rehabilitation specialists. Attendees will learn strategies for patient evaluation, preoperative counseling, staged rehabilitation, gait retraining, prosthetic planning, and management of common soft-tissue issues at the abutment. Case-based discussions will emphasize interdisciplinary decision-making and real-world application, giving participants clinic-ready strategies to optimize functional outcomes and coordinate care across the surgical and rehabilitation continuum.





Strength, Science, and Service: TBI Lessons From Caring for Veterans

Polytrauma care in Veterans is uniquely complex due to co-morbid TBI, chronic pain and PTSD sequelae collectively known as the polytrauma triad. This, combined with the loss of military identity and purpose, creates a multifaceted clinical presentation requiring precision and coordination. The VA's Polytrauma/TBI System of Care meets this challenge through robust interdisciplinary teams and research-integrating rehabilitation, mental health, medical care, and community reintegration, offering powerful lessons for evaluating polytrauma triad care across all healthcare settings. Further, national VA initiatives in Whole Health, and specifically Total Brain Health, provides evidence-based resources for clinicians and patients.



Demystifying Clinical Informatics: Practical Tools for the Practicing Psychiatrist

What is clinical informatics, and why does it matter to your daily practice? The vast majority of patients admitted to IR are age 65 or older. Few IRH/IRU have geriatric rehabilitation programs. The Age-Friendly Health Systems by IHI was designed to address the 4Ms and has been shown to decrease falls, address adverse effects, hospitalizations, acute care and ICU length of stay, health care costs, and increases patient satisfaction. This session provides education on the 4Ms in IRF in improving the quality of care. Psychiatrists' focus on function makes us naturally suited leaders in age-friendly care. IRF are an ideal setting to implement age-friendly care focusing on function, medications and what matters most.



From Street to Housing: Rehabilitation Care for an Unhoused Population

A vicious cycle exists at the intersection of disability and homelessness: People experiencing homelessness (PEH) are more likely to acquire a disability, and people with disabilities are more likely to become homeless. While rehabilitation can improve function to break this cycle, over 50% of PEH have unmet rehabilitation needs. Our innovative models bring interdisciplinary PM&R and occupational therapy directly to people outdoors, in shelters, and housing to facilitate both equitable rehabilitation and permanent transition out of homelessness. We will discuss our program development, systems-level interventions, patient stories, and strategies to bring rehabilitation to PEH in your own community.



PM&R Boards Part I & II: Tips for Success from the ABPMR

Early PM&R Integration in Acute Care: A High Value Model for Academic Health Systems

Early PM&R integration in acute care improves outcomes, reduces LOS, and strengthens hospital throughput. Attendees will gain tools to advocate for and build a similar program within their institutions.



Beyond the Clinic: Scaling Evidence-Based Integrative Care in Academic Cancer Rehabilitation

As cancer survivorship increases, psychiatrists are managing complex late effects such as fatigue, neuropathy, and chronic pain. Many patients seek integrative or “alternative” therapies, yet evidence based clinical pathways remain limited. This session addresses that gap by providing an overview of current evidence for non pharmacologic interventions—such as acupuncture, mindfulness, and yoga—and a practical roadmap for incorporating these services into an academic PM&R department. Faculty will highlight the psychiatry led integrative care model, emphasizing scientific rigor, reimbursement strategies, and trainee education, while noting that some integrative oncology services are partially supported through philanthropic funding.



Transforming Literature to Action: Pain Management in the Oldest-Old Within Skilled Nursing Facilities

Patients aged 85 years and older are the fastest-growing patient population and the most challenging to treat. When guidelines say “avoid” and hospitalization isn’t an option, what’s next? This session delivers practical, evidence-based strategies for managing pain in patients over 85 years old with complex comorbidities in SNF/SAR settings. Participants will learn pharmacologic modifications, nonpharmacologic alternatives, and goals-of-care alignment techniques through interactive discussion and problem-solving. Walk away with actionable tools to bridge the gap between what literature recommends and what is achievable at the bedside.



Rehabilitation as Adaptive Medicine: Forging Forward Under Fire

This session will explore how rehabilitation can be embedded early and effectively as part of the emergency crisis response in active conflict zones to improve patient survival, function and dignity. This combined with ongoing commitment, can lead to improved survivorship and longer-term rehabilitation success in war-affected regions.



Continuity in Motion: Limb Loss Care from Amputation to Ambulation

This session provides a high-yield, board exam and clinically relevant overview of the continuum of care in limb loss, from acute surgical decision-making through rehabilitation, prosthetic prescription, and long-term reintegration. Attendees will gain practical insight into functional assessment, prosthetic selection, and strategies to optimize outcomes in amputee care. Emerging technologies, including microprocessor components, neuroprosthetics and osseointegration, will be highlighted alongside evidence-based rehabilitation principles. Through case-based discussion and interactive learning, participants will leave with tools to improve patient outcomes and confidently navigate multidisciplinary limb loss care in modern practice.



Beyond Steroids and Surgery: Intradiscal Biologics for Discogenic Low Back Pain

This session reviews the evolving role of intradiscal biologic therapies in discogenic low back pain, beginning with the pathoanatomy, imaging features, and diagnostic algorithm needed to accurately identify disc-mediated pain. Faculty will examine current evidence for PRP, mesenchymal stem cells, and emerging nucleus pulposus-derived allograft products, with attention to mechanisms of action, patient selection, procedural technique, outcomes, and durability. The course will also address regulatory oversight, ethical use, coding considerations, and clinical integration within modern spine care. Attendees will gain a practical, evidence-based framework for evaluating, selecting, and counseling patients regarding these emerging regenerative treatment options.



Extracorporeal Shockwave Therapy for Management of Musculoskeletal and Neurological Conditions in Physiatry

Case-based discussions will highlight patient selection, treatment protocols, and real-world applications. Participants will gain practical skills to integrate ESWT into clinical care and optimize outcomes, making this session highly relevant for physiatrists seeking to expand non-invasive treatment options.



LA 28: Will it Change the Paralympics?

The Olympics are returning to Los Angeles in 2028 but now including the Paralympics for the first time. This session will review of the history of prior US Paralympic Games, provide an update on ongoing preparations and opportunities for LA 28 as the Games draw closer and gain the perspective of a former Paralympic Gold Medalist. With an anticipated increase in the number of para-athletes competing on the "LA 28 stage" physiatrists can play a unique role in advocating and lowering barriers to sport participation for all current and future athletes, especially those with disabilities.



Prognosticating Neurological Outcome after Spinal Cord Injury

Prognostication after spinal cord injury (SCI) is a critical, evolving aspect of rehabilitation with implications for patients, clinicians, and research. This 90 minute session presents an evidence-based framework for predicting neurological and functional recovery by integrating clinical examination, imaging, and emerging biomarkers and electrodiagnostics. Through case-based learning, participants will apply key predictors such as motor strength, sensory preservation, sacral sparing, and AIS classification to real-world scenarios. The session also reviews modifiers including age, injury etiology, comorbidities, and surgical timing, and highlights the growing role of MRI and novel diagnostic tools in advancing precision medicine and individualized rehabilitation planning.



Architecting the Scholar: A Multi-Institutional Blueprint for Evidence-Based Medicine and Resident Research Curricula

While the ACGME requires scholarly activity, the "how" remains a moving target for many PM&R departments. Moving beyond theoretical goals, the panelists will provide a granular look at their organizational structures, faculty engagement strategies, and the longitudinal integration of research literacy. Attendees will gain actionable insights into overcoming common hurdles, such as clinical faculty engagement and the measurement of "success" in resident scholarship.



Developing an Interventional Spasticity Practice in Academic Physiatry: From Clinical Foundations to Program Implementation

This session provides an academic framework for developing and teaching an interventional spasticity practice, including procedural techniques, localization methods, and program implementation strategies within PM&R training environments.



Neuromodulation and the New Recovery Landscape in Spinal Cord Injury

Neuromodulation is reshaping the recovery landscape in spinal cord injury. Faculty will review key studies, practical considerations for clinical translation, and the challenges that remain as this field evolves. Designed for physiatrists and rehabilitation clinicians, the course highlights how neuromodulation may alter treatment goals, expand restorative possibilities, and redefine what recovery can look like for individuals living with spinal cord injury in modern rehabilitation practice



Traumatic Brain Injury as a Chronic Condition

Reframe traumatic brain injury (TBI) as a chronic, dynamic condition rather than a one-time event. This session will highlight emerging evidence on long-term functional, medical, and social trajectories, and risk for late decline. Through case-based discussion and practical frameworks, participants will learn how to implement chronic disease management strategies--proactive follow-up, comorbidity screening, self-management, and lifestyle interventions--into clinical practice. Aligned with guidance from the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, this session equips physiatrists with actionable tools to improve long-term outcomes after TBI.



Transforming Health Care with Disability Education

There is a critical need for culturally sensitive, anti-ableist education across the health sciences. This session highlights innovative interdisciplinary disability education programs designed by physiatrists. The presenters will share practical frameworks for designing, implementing, and sustaining disability curricula that center lived experience, disability culture, and health equity. Participants will explore strategies for integrating disability competencies into local training programs and fostering partnerships across disciplines. Attendees will leave with concrete tools to begin transforming their own institutions' approach to disability education.



From Awareness to Action: Navigating Microaggressions and Workplace Discrimination in Academic Physiatry

Participants will develop practical communication strategies to respond as recipients, bystanders, and leaders while exploring systems-level approaches that promote physician well-being, professionalism, and inclusive academic cultures.



Physiatrists in the ICU: Defining a New Frontier in Acute Rehabilitation Medicine

Critical care has achieved remarkable gains in survival, yet many patients leave the ICU with significant functional impairment, including weakness, cognitive changes, and reduced independence. Increasingly, recovery demands attention not only to survival, but to function from the earliest stages of illness. Physiatrists are uniquely equipped to meet this need through expertise in neuromuscular physiology, functional assessment, and rehabilitation. Within the past four years, physiatrists have begun entering neurocritical care fellowships, establishing a new pathway into ICU practice. This session explores why physiatry belongs in critical care, why trainees should consider this path, and what physiatrists contribute in this setting.



Translating Evidence to Action: Guiding Clinical Practice with Research in Cancer Rehabilitation

As cancer treatments become more effective, the focus has shifted to not just survival but also thriving during and after treatment. This session will provide a framework for integrating evidence-based clinical research into cancer rehabilitation. We will begin by defining what constitutes high-quality evidence in the context of cancer rehabilitation, and present eight practice changing papers that will enhance the knowledge of physiatrists treating cancer patients.



PM&R Residency Research: Drivers, Barriers, and Solutions

This session examines drivers and barriers to research productivity in PM&R residency programs, highlighting institutional factors, mentorship structures, and training approaches that influence scholarly output. Presenters will share evidence-based insights, programmatic innovations, and trainee perspectives to address common challenges, including the “hidden curriculum” in research. Strategies to enhance resident and medical student engagement, such as protected time, specific research requirements, structured curricula, and mentorship models, will be discussed. Attendees will gain practical tools to strengthen research culture, improve productivity, and support the development of future clinician-scientists within their institutions.



Optimizing Inpatient Rehabilitation Facility (IRF) Physician Documentation to Accurately Capture Patient Complexity and Improve Medicare Reimbursement

This session will present a quality improvement initiative using an EMR-integrated documentation tool that provides real-time guidance to improve comorbidity capture in IRF physician documentation. Participants will review key components of the Medicare IRF PPS, identify common documentation gaps, and learn strategies to align documentation with patient complexity. Outcomes demonstrating over \$10 million in increased reimbursement at one institution and expansion to a second health system will be shared. Attendees will gain practical, scalable approaches to improve documentation accuracy, enhance trainee education, and optimize reimbursement while maintaining efficient clinical workflows.



Transforming Global Physiatry: AAP GAPS as the Catalyst for International Academic Innovation

In 60 minutes, participants will explore GAPS initiatives—including curriculum mapping, training the trainers, and

research incubators—that build rehabilitation capacity and support bidirectional exchange. Real world examples from global collaborations will demonstrate how to develop and sustain academic infrastructure in low resource settings, equipping attendees with practical strategies to expand their institutions’ global engagement and academic impact.



From Crisis to Function: A Multidisciplinary Roadmap for Pediatric Functional Neurological Disorder Across the Continuum of Care Through Inpatient Rehabilitation

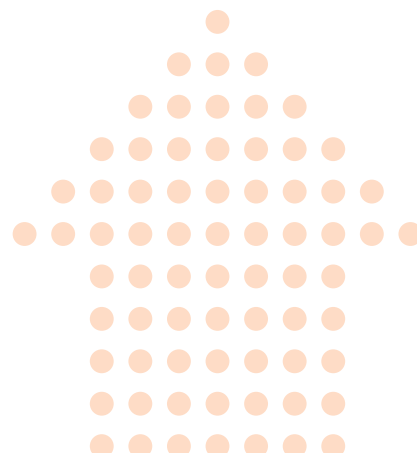

Advanced Interventional Treatments for Osteoarthritis

Attendees will become familiar with these osteoarthritis interventions for potential implementation in their own practice and/or referral to appropriate specialists.





Breaking the Mold: Identity, Disability, and the Power of Lived Experience

Managing Up: Diplomacy and the Soft Skills for Success in the Workplace

Managing Up: Diplomacy and the Soft Skills of Success for Trainees – Early-career clinicians often lack structured training in the interpersonal skills required to navigate hierarchical teams, advocate for patient safety, and advance professionally. This interactive 60-minute workshop teaches practical, evidence-informed approaches to “managing up”: communicating clearly, delivering upward feedback, negotiating workload, and escalating concerns with diplomacy. Participants leave with a concise phrasing cheat-sheet and a personalized action plan to implement two concrete managing-up behaviors in their clinical environments. Ideal for early-career attendees seeking transferable soft skills to improve team functioning, patient safety, and career development.



The Future of Pain Fellowship Training: The Integrated PM&R and Pain Training Pathway

This session presents a practical, competency-based 4 year integrated PM&R-Pain training model that preserves full PM&R requirements while embedding longitudinal pain education and a dedicated fellowship year. Attendees will review a visual curriculum timeline, progressive procedural entrustment milestones, assessment tools, and a phased implementation checklist addressing faculty roles, clinical volume, accreditation, and sustainability. Program leaders will discuss curriculum design, assessment strategies, and real-world implementation

considerations. Participants – program directors, educators, and trainees – will gain actionable steps to pilot or adapt an integrated pathway that produces clinicians skilled in functional, multidisciplinary, and interventional pain care.



Beyond Bed Management: Applying the Theory of Constraints to Optimize the Full Continuum of Acute and Post-Acute Rehabilitation Care

Why do we keep optimizing for a part and not the whole? Not considering an entire system creates bottlenecks. This session applies Eliyahu Goldratt’s Theory of Constraints to the full patient journey, from acute admission through inpatient rehabilitation revealing why local efficiency improvements often degrade system-level throughput. We examine how statistical fluctuations compound across dependent events to create invisible bottlenecks. This session finishes with collaborative operational strategies that require all partners to subordinate to the system’s true bottleneck. Participants will leave with practical tools for identifying and exploiting constraints across the care continuum.



From Bench to Bedside: Women’s Musculoskeletal Health Across the Lifespan

This interactive session will provide academic physiatrists and rehabilitation scientists with evidence-based, clinically actionable insights on the relationship between hormonal physiology, biomechanics, and common musculoskeletal conditions across the female lifespan. Through lectures and case-based learning, participants will explore the unique musculoskeletal considerations of each reproductive stage and learn how to apply this knowledge to improve recognition, treatment, and prevention of common conditions in women.



Implementing Lifestyle Medicine into a Psychiatry Practice

and sleep wearables, physical activity, diets, supplements, and stress management, on performance, recovery, and maximization of existing therapies.



Contemporary Clinical Trial Designs for Rehabilitation Research

Data Collection in Orthobiologics: The Need for More and Better Data to Assess their Efficacy and Develop Treatment Paradigms for Musculoskeletal Conditions

Attendees will gain practical strategies for critically appraising the Orthobiologic literature and learn how enhanced data quality can help advance research, optimize patient selection, and improve clinical outcomes.



Washington Update Year-In-Review: What You Need to Know - Past, Present, Future

Big Data and AI for Stroke Rehabilitation and Beyond

Many efforts are underway to harness the power of artificial intelligence (AI) to improve rehabilitation medicine. However, all AI-based clinical efforts require

large, heterogenous rehabilitation datasets that provide the granularity used in clinical decision making – datasets which are currently still sparse. In this talk, I will review ongoing efforts to generate large stroke rehabilitation and neuroimaging datasets through the ENIGMA Stroke Recovery Working Group, as well as data-driven discoveries based on this work. I will then discuss current efforts to harmonize both retrospective and prospective rehabilitation data, within and beyond stroke, touching on new initiatives such as the Data Science and Analytics for Precision Rehabilitation (DAPR) Center. Overall, this talk aims to provide an overview of current efforts and resources around AI and big data for rehabilitation researchers.



Spinal Cord Injury Skills: Essential Interventions You Recommend but Rarely Perform

This skills lab designed for medical trainees and early-career physicians, with demonstrations of key skills, including: Cough-assist device use and its technique, digital rectal stimulation for management of reflexive bowel as well as irrigation systems, and adaptive cycling equipment options.



AI, QI, and Disability Inclusion in PM&R Education: Better Tools, Better Methods, Better Values

Participants will explore practical strategies including AI-supported case simulation, educational QI metrics, and universal design for learning. Through demonstrations and collaborative exercises, participants will develop concrete plans to improve accessibility, representation, and measurable educational outcomes within their own training programs.



Heck Yes or Fudge No: The Career Advancement Showdown

Through structured argument, live rebuttal, and judicial critique, attendees will sharpen decision-making skills, strategic thinking, and professional prioritization in a fast-paced, engaging format. Cases will be created collaboratively by the host and judges in advance. Teams will not preview scenarios to preserve authenticity and real-time reasoning.



Artificial Intelligence and Graduate Medical Education: Incorporating New Technologies Safely and Responsibly

Participants will explore best practice guidelines for responsible integration in GME and engage in structured reflection on how AI intersects with their own teaching, assessment and supervision. The session equips educators to prepare trainees for safe, ethical, and effective AI use.



Competency-Based Medical Education in PM&R Training Programs: Implementation, Challenges, and Future Directions

This interactive session introduces physiatrists to diaphragm ultrasound techniques and their clinical applications, including evaluation for ventilator weaning and diaphragmatic pacing candidacy. After a brief evidence-based overview, participants will break into small groups for hands-on training using ultrasound to assess diaphragm thickness, contractility, and excursion. This session emphasizes practical skill development and provides attendees with actionable techniques that can be incorporated into clinical practice.



Risk, Resilience, and Reinvention: How Women in Medicine Turn Failure into Future Success

What's Missing from Undergraduate Medical Education? You! Workshopping the Inclusion of PM&R in Medical School Curricula

Despite the high prevalence of these conditions, PM&R remains underrepresented in curricula, with only a small percentage of schools requiring a clerkship. Through expert perspectives, small-group collaboration, and guided reflection, participants will identify curricular opportunities, address institutional barriers, and align PM&R content with national competency frameworks. Using Kern's model, attendees will create individualized action plans to expand their educational impact, enhance visibility, and strengthen PM&R's presence in UME.



Regenerative Rehabilitation Strategies to Treat Skeletal Myopathies and Cardiomyopathy: Novel Cell and Gene Therapy Approaches

Cell and gene therapies for the treatment of muscular dystrophy (both skeletal myopathy and cardiomyopathy) represents an exciting and illustrative regenerative rehabilitation approach with translation from bench to bedside and FDA approvals of a number of novel therapies. The course will focus on 1) heart-derived cell therapy with sequential IV administration to treat muscular dystrophy and the subsequent development of bio-inspired small molecule therapies based on the cargo of secreted extracellular vesicles; 2) unique contributions of a physician scientist in physiatry to clinical trials of regenerative cell and gene therapies, and 3) novel non-viral gene delivery and gene editing strategies.



Know Before You Go: Needs Assessment, Program Development, and the Art of Closing the Right Gaps in Global PM&R

Effective PM&R program development in international and underserved settings requires more than good intentions – it requires structured, context-specific inquiry. As part of the GAPS-led Global PM&R Curriculum Initiative, this session offers physiatrists and trainees a practical, evidence-informed framework for needs assessment and gaps analysis, grounded in public health methodology and implementation science. A real-world case study from Ghana illustrates how rigorous assessment refines assumptions and shapes program development decisions. Participants leave with a reusable planning worksheet and practical tools to support early-stage program development in local and international contexts.



Hypermobility How-Tos: Evaluating and Understanding Patients with Ehlers-Danlos Syndromes and Hypermobility Spectrum Disorders

Hypermobile Ehlers-Danlos syndrome (hEDS) and hypermobility spectrum disorders (HSD) cause considerable pain and disability. Physiatrists increasingly see people with these conditions and need to know how to address them. This course will teach you to efficiently evaluate, diagnose, and start treatment for patients with hEDS and HSD. Learn to take a tailored medical history, perform a focused physical exam, recognize and address common comorbidities, and apply the new international diagnostic criteria for hEDS and HSD.



Precision Non-Invasive Brain Stimulation for Stroke Motor Recovery

Non-invasive brain stimulation (NIBS), especially tDCS, has not shown population-wide efficacy in larger clinical trials, possibly due to a lack of patient-specific tailoring. In the session, we will discuss how we can improve precision of NIBS and personalize NIBS treatment, including optimization of tACS parameters, integration of brain network activity patterns, and utilization of high-definition electrodes to personalize tDCS treatment for stroke patients.



Financial Sustainability & Budgets I (ADC session)

This session will provide a practical overview of financial sustainability in academic PM&R departments, including budgeting frameworks, revenue diversification, and expense management. Speakers will share real-world examples of navigating margin compression, aligning budgets to strategic growth, and managing cross-subsidization across missions. The session will include case-based discussion and time for participant Q&A.

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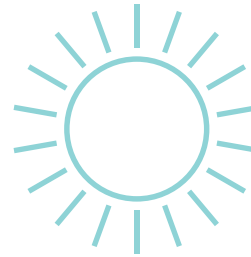

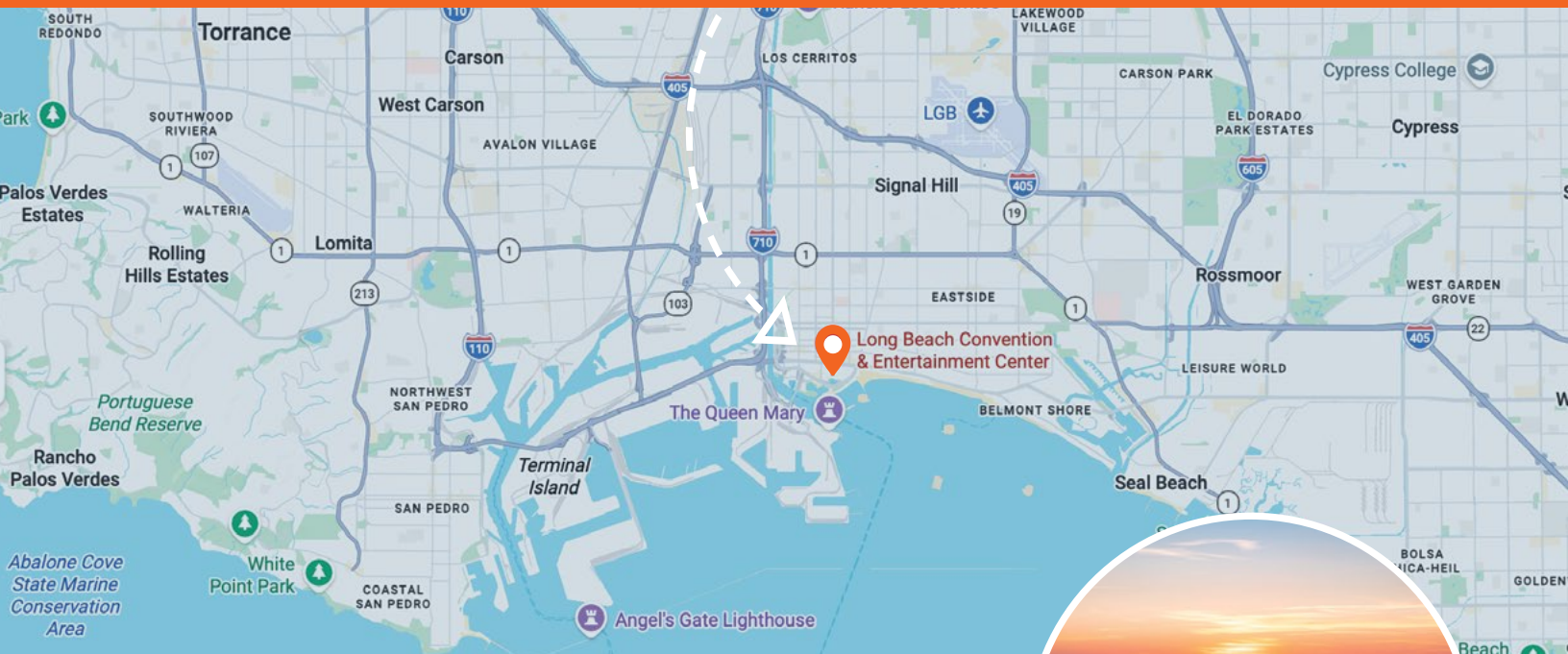

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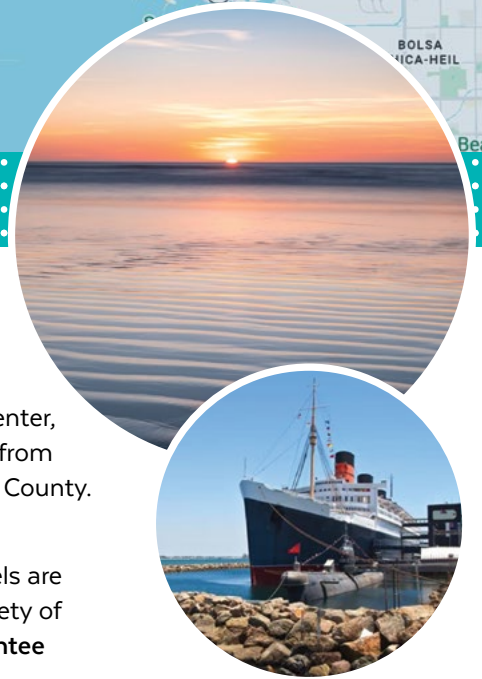
