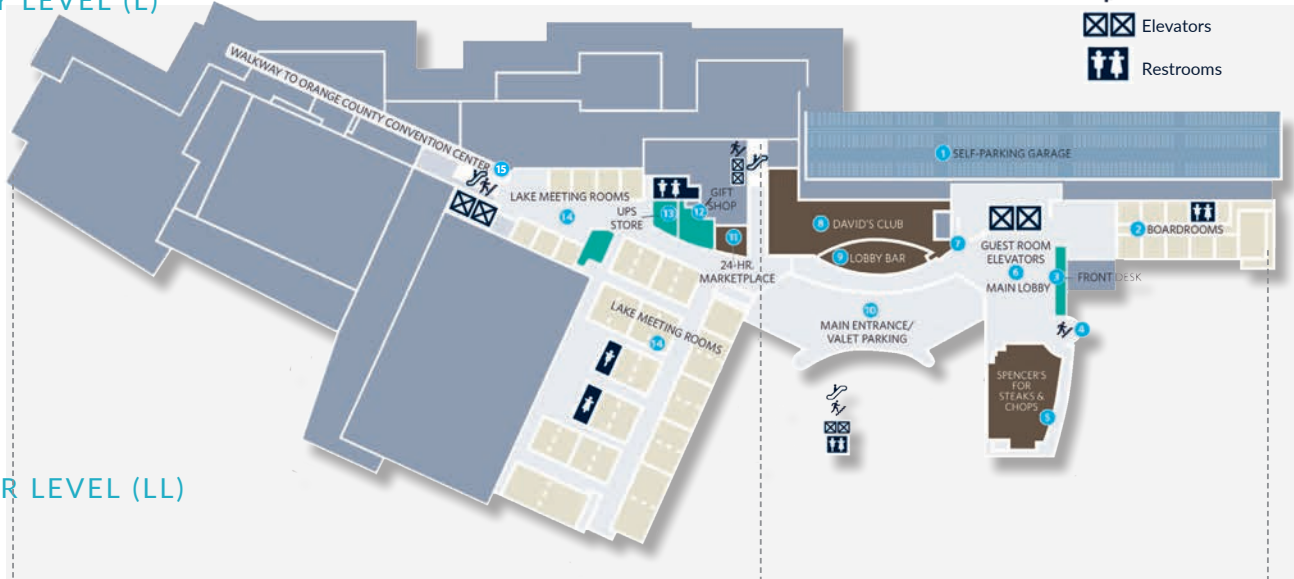

OVERVIEW

The ASAM Pain & Addiction: Common Threads Course is one of ASAM's longest running and most popular courses. In response to the worsening opioid epidemic, DHHS expanded buprenorphine prescribing privileges to NPs and PAs and increased prescribing limits for physicians in 2016. However, even among DATA 2000 waived physicians, up to 40 percent have never prescribed buprenorphine. Research with physician prescribers has identified barriers to buprenorphine prescribing at the patient, provider, and systems level. Case-based experiential learning can address these barriers and empower clinicians to effectively provide buprenorphine.

The high turnover in jails and pre-trial detention centers present unique challenges to in-house medication programs with the result that a significant percentage of justice involved populations with OUD are not served. In this interactive panel discussion, presenters will describe the development of Project Connections to Re-Entry (PCARE), a novel treatment model to expand access to buprenorphine for those leaving or recently released from the jail. A small clinical team operates out of a mobile van sitting outside the Baltimore jail and provides on-demand treatment.

Assessing Burnout and Alcohol Use in Medical Students and Practicing Physicians

Medical student, resident, and practicing physician burnout coincident with alcohol use impact both personal functioning and patient care. Burnout and alcohol use must be recognized in early medical training before dangerous coping patterns are established and to guide the resiliency strategies to the stresses of clinical practice. Healthcare professional must be skilled at assessing current coping mechanisms including alcohol use. The presentation combines multiple teaching methods to establish skills that aid the addiction specialist in identifying and intervening in colleagues with the lethal combination of burnout and alcohol use. First 1000 Days: Transforming Substance Use Disorder Care for the Growing Family

To address the concerning rise in substance use and overdose among pregnant and postpartum women, Massachusetts General Hospital's Substance Use Disorder Initiative launched the HOPE Clinic, a multidisciplinary clinical program caring for pregnant, postpartum, and parenting women with SUD, their partners, and their infants from conception of pregnancy through early childhood. In this session, presenters will discuss key facilitators and barriers to implementation including engaging stakeholders from across the institution and re-structuring the existing siloed models of care to aid others interested in creating a similar program. Cognitive Behavior Therapy (CBT) has been successfully used to alleviate suffering for patients who have chronic pain and use opioids with the hope of getting relief. CBT helps patients to lessen their pain and better tolerate the pain they do have. CBT also helps patients to cope with cravings and make necessary life changes, so that they rely less on opioids to manage their pain. During this interactive session, participants will learn CBT techniques to use during medical and psychiatric visits, to enhance motivation, reduce pain, manage stress, cope with cravings to use opiates and to facilitate positive behavioral changes.

These successful programs offer useful lessons in the essential elements of this new paradigm of recovery for families.

Problem Drinking Among Medically Underserved Women: New Horizons in Treatment

For example, by some estimates both Black and Hispanic women have approximately one-quarter the odds of obtaining alcohol services as White women. This symposium will address best approaches to improving access to care and delivering alcohol treatment tailored to the social needs and cultural influences of three groups of medically underserved women: American Indian and Alaska Native women; African American women; and Hispanic American women.

The Massachusetts General Hospital Bridge Clinic is a multidisciplinary, immediate access low threshold transitional clinic. This includes expanding to 7 days per week, evening hours, and enhancing the range of services offered, including medication management, recovery coaching, optional psychotherapy, psychopharmacology, and groups for individuals unable to access care in the community. The primary goal has always been to “meet people where they are” and to initiate pharmacotherapy, followed by stabilization and eventual linkage to community based treatment. Presenters will describe the evolution of the Bridge Clinic model including lessons learned, reasons for the changes made, and a review of outcomes; providing attendees with concrete tools to start their own Bridge Clinic.

Despite information of the potential risks, an estimated 8% of women continue to smoke during pregnancy. Pregnancy is a potential period of time with increased maternal motivation towards smoking cessation interventions, which could possibly be maintained postpartum. While psycho education and pharmacological therapy have been studied more extensively and found to be helpful, there is limited evidence informing the safety of Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems (ENDS). Also, the long-term effect of nicotine exposure in utero on growth, development and behavior of the offspring remain to be studied in more detail.

Ethical Dilemmas in Substance Use Disorders

Ethical issues have become more prominent in caring for patients with addiction, with stigma being a contributing factor. Perceptions of substance use disorder as a patient choice continue to taint appropriate medical care for patients with substance use disorders. The workshop will initially review the ethical principles of autonomy, beneficence, non-maleficence, justice, fidelity and utility and apply these concepts to patient case discussions. Scenarios will include patients making perceived “poor choices”, specialist refusal of care, “mandated” treatment, and organ transplantation in patients with substance use disorder. Opioids use has accounted for 70% of the negative health impact associated with drug use disorders worldwide. The current prescription opioid epidemic resulted in an estimated 42,000 deaths in 2016 with a cost of \$78.5 billion. This may be partly due to a few unscrupulous clinicians who have over-prescribed large quantities of opioid pain medications, but the addiction medicine and addiction clinicians/psychiatrists still play an important role in intervening with appropriate treatment and recovery programs for the patient with substance use disorder. This symposium speakers will discuss the role of addiction medicine, the role of bio-psycho-social-spiritual dimensions of addiction, the 12-step model as used in the US and Iran, PTSD and SUD, and finally, developments in addiction medicine in the Middle East and Northern Africa.

As part of Denver Health's integrated health system, this program has provided medication assisted treatment for hundreds of patients who find that there is “no wrong door” for accessing treatment--patients may be started in outpatient clinics, the emergency department, jail, and other sites. Initial treatment outcomes demonstrate comparable treatment retention to prior literature notwithstanding this highly co-morbid and heterogeneous population. Presenters discuss original data and implementation challenges.

Cook County Medical Examiner/Clinical Data Linkage to Inform Overdose Prevention Strategy

Deaths from opioid overdose have increased across the US and within Cook County, IL in recent years. Cook County Health (CCH) is a safety-net healthcare system that provides care for many patients at risk of fatal



opioid overdose. In recognition of increased healthcare utilization prior to overdoses, presenters examined clinical encounters preceding fatal opioid overdose in 2017. All 2017 cases of illicit opioid fatalities in the Cook County medical examiner database were merged with CCH electronic records, with encounter history and ICD codes pulled for matched records. These data describe demographics for illicit opioid overdose, healthcare utilization, and co-morbid conditions for decedents in CCH. This work will guide discussion of existing and novel interventions to improve strategies for management of opioid use disorder.

MAT on the Front Lines: ED Buprenorphine Initiation at a Community Hospital

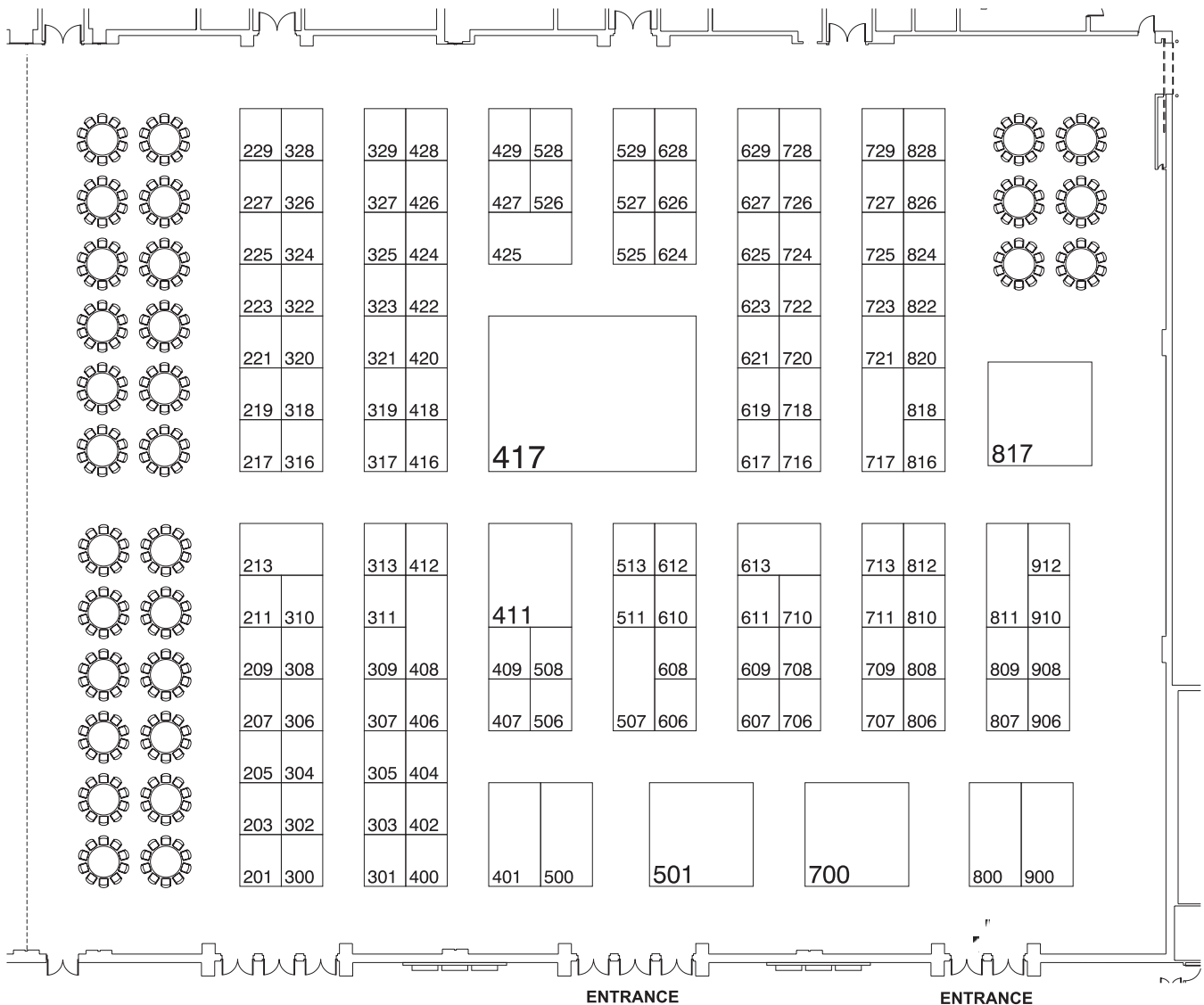
