JCLC History

The Joint Conference of Librarians of Color (JCLC) began as a dream held by Satia Marshall Orange, former director of the Office for Literacy and Outreach Services (OLOS). Satia recognized that “the [ethnic] caucuses’ power existed with their collaboration” with one another. She nurtured these relations by hosting Thursday (pre ALA-conference) Ethnic Caucus dinners of presidents and vice-presidents and the Diversity Officer, Sandra Balderrama. This was prior to the creation of the Office for Diversity. As Sandra eloquently stated, “Satia really worked on encouraging collaboration between caucuses and active support of one another’s issues.”

The seeds were planted between 1998 - 1999 and the vision developed during these joint meetings of the ethnic caucus leaders, and in 2002 the first meeting of the 2006 Joint Conference of Librarians of Color Steering Committee (SC) was held.

JCLC 2006

The first Joint Conference of Librarians of Color was held October 11-15, 2006 in Dallas, Texas. The theme was "Gathering at the Waters: Embracing our Spirits, Telling our Stories". It was the first-ever national conference to be held and sponsored by all five Associations of Ethnic Librarians.

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OPENING GENERAL SESSION SPEAKER BENJAMIN ALIRE SÁENZ

Benjamin Alire Sáenz was born in 1954 in his grandmother's house in Old Picacho, a small farming village in the outskirts of Las Cruces, New Mexico in 1954. He was the fourth of seven children and was raised on a small farm. Ben Sáenz considers himself a *fronterizo*, a person of the border with a deep passion for political and cultural activism. Benjamin Sáenz is a recognized novelist, poet, and essayist. He is a prolific writer who has received numerous recognitions for his adult and youth novels. The book *Everything Begins & Ends* at the Kentucky Club won the PEN/Faulkner Award for Fiction in 2013, making Sáenz the first Latino writer ever to win the award. This book also won a Lambda Literary Award in the Gay Fiction category at the 2013 Lambda Literary Awards and was named at a 2014 Stonewall Honor Book by the American Library Association. His novel *Aristotle and Dante Discover the Secrets of the Universe* was a Printz Honor Book, the Lambda Literary Award winner, and a finalist for the Amelia Elizabeth Walden Award. Mr. Sáenz lives in El Paso, Texas and is retired from teaching creative writing at the University of Texas, El Paso.

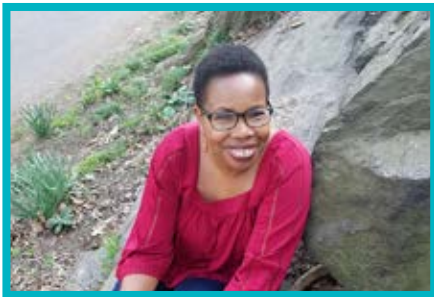

Recipient of awards from the American Library Association, Texas Institute of Letters and Texas Associated Press, he has written several titles, most notably the Pura Belpré Honor Book "The Smoking Mirror."

MaryLouise Patterson is a pediatrician, retired from clinical practice at Cornell Medical College - New York Hospital. She is the daughter of Langston Hughes's cherished friends, Louise Thompson Patterson and William L. Patterson, whose letters contribute to the book she co-edited, "Letters from Langston: From the Harlem Renaissance to the Red Scare and Beyond". Hughes was a frequent guest in the home of the Patterson family and was like an uncle to MaryLouise.

Ron Querry is the author of a half-dozen books, including the award-winning novel, "The Death of Bernadette Lefthand." He has a PhD in American Studies from the University of New Mexico and his writing frequently depicts the intersection of white and native worlds. Of mixed Native American and European American descent, Querry is an enrolled member of the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma. He lives in northern New Mexico.

Albuquerque offers visitors unique attractions that one truly needs to explore to experience this beautiful city.

Families can enjoy excursions to the Rio Grande Zoo, or the Albuquerque Aquarium and Botanical Gardens. Outdoor enthusiasts can experience the amazing landscape by taking a ride on the Sandia Tram, which is the longest tram in North America. Sports fans can catch an Isotopes baseball game, enjoy a round on one of the area's affordable championship golf courses, or howl with the Lobos at a UNM athletic event.

Albuquerque is also home to The Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta® presented by Canon, the world's largest hot air balloon festival, which takes place each October, when you'll see hundreds of balloons in the sky at a time.

New Mexico is home to 22 tribes, including the Navajo Nation, Jicarilla Apache, Mescalero Apache and 19 pueblos. Each tribe is unique and has its own traditional language, customs, values, prayers, songs, ceremonies, attire and way of life.

The Indian Pueblo Cultural Center in Albuquerque is a valuable resource for visitors interested in learning more about the tribes and Native American traditions in New Mexico. The Cultural Center features a museum, restaurant and gift shop and offers information about visiting the pueblos, as well as a calendar of feast days and other events.

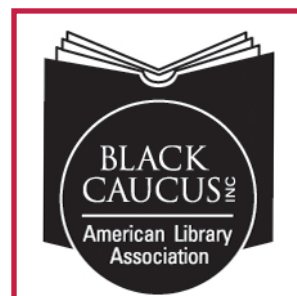
Asian/Pacific American Librarians Association (APALA)

Founded in 1980, the Asian/Pacific American Librarians Association (APALA) was incorporated in Illinois in 1981 and formally affiliated with the ALA in 1982. A predecessor of APALA, the Asian American Librarians Caucus (AALC), was organized in 1975 as a discussion group of the ALA Office for Library Outreach Services reflecting the interest in library services to minority communities and professional support of librarians of minority ancestry that prevailed in the ALA in the 1960s and 70s. APALA and AALC before it was organized/founded by librarians of diverse Asian/Pacific ancestries committed to working together toward a common goal: to create an organization that would address the needs of Asian/Pacific American librarians and those who serve Asian/Pacific American communities. *Exhibit hall booth #404.*



Black Caucus of the American Library Association (BCALA)

The Black Caucus of the American Library Association (BCALA) serves as an advocate for the development, promotion, and improvement of library services and resources to the nation's African American community. Founded by ALA Past President E.J. Josey in 1970, the organization provides leadership for the recruitment and professional development of African American librarians, and also serves as a clearinghouse for information about Black Librarians in promoting their wider participation at all levels of the profession. *Exhibit hall booth #402.*



Chinese American Librarians Association (CALA)

The Chinese American Librarians Association (CALA) started in 1973 as Mid-West Chinese American Librarians Association, a regional organization in Illinois. A year later, Chinese Librarians Association was formed in California in 1974. In 1976, Mid-West Chinese American Librarians Association was expanded to a national organization as Chinese American Librarians Association. By 1979, CALA had five chapters in Northeast, Mid-West, Atlantic, Southwest and California respectively. Chinese American Librarians Association and Chinese Librarians Association were merged in 1983. The merged organization retains CALA's English name and Chinese Librarians Association's Chinese name. *Exhibit hall booth #408.*



REFORMA, the National Association to Promote Library and Information Services to Latinos and the Spanish Speaking

Dr. Arnulfo Trejo founded REFORMA in 1971. As an affiliate of the ALA, REFORMA has actively sought to promote the development of library collections to include Spanish-language and Latino oriented materials. The organization works to recruit bilingual and bicultural library professionals and support staff, and the development of library services and programs that meet the needs of the Latino community. REFORMA supports efforts to educate the U.S. Latino population to the availability and types of library services, as well as efforts to preserve existing library resource centers serving the interests of Latinos. *Exhibit hall booth #T10.*
